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INTRODUCTION

AUCCCD

The Association for University and College Counseling Center Directors (AUCCCD) is an international organization comprised of colleges and universities from the United States and its territories, Antigua and Barbuda, Australia, Canada, China, Egypt, Grenada, Ireland, Japan, Qatar, St. Kitts and Nevis, and the United Kingdom. AUCCCD works to be the higher education leader for collegiate mental health.

The AUCCCD Annual Survey Overview

In 2006, AUCCCD first developed and administered the Annual Survey to its membership as a means to increase the objective understanding of factors critical to the functioning of college and university counseling centers.

The survey continues to provide important information about trends in counseling center service delivery. Each year also has several rotating areas of special interest. This year's survey also included information about center budgets and billing, electronic health records, and relationships with Student Health Services. An ongoing area of focus for the past several years has been third-party vendors and the ongoing difficulties centers have in managing turnover of positions and recruitment of new staff.

In July 2025, all (non-emeriti) members of AUCCCD were invited to complete the Annual Survey administered through Survey Monkey software. Unique survey links were sent to 944 verified email accounts. A total of 488 counseling center directors responded to the 2024-2025 Survey, a 51.7% return rate. However, not every director responded to every question and thus, throughout this report, the number of directors/centers/institutions represented by each variable differs.

The reporting period for the information on the Annual Survey was July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025. This monograph provides a summary of these data.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A total of 488 counseling center directors responded to the 2024-2025 AUCCCD survey.

Institution Information

Institutions represented in this report were primarily within the United States or its territories (97.7%) and were primarily 4-year colleges or universities (85.7%). The sample was largely urban or urban adjacent institutions (70.8%). Schools with enrollments less than 7,501 comprised 54.6% of the sample. Very large institutions (35,001 and above) comprised 8.0% of the sample.

Minority Serving or Tribal Institutions comprised 20.5% of reporting institutions. Of these, the majority (81%) were schools with a Hispanic Serving Institution designation, followed by Asian American and Pacific Islander Serving (14%), Historically Black College or University (12%), and Native American serving (4%). Religiously affiliated institutions comprised 18.9% of the sample, with the most frequent (53.3%) affiliation being the Roman Catholic Church.

Center Information

Staffing. Counseling centers represented in this sample were largely open 12 months a year (79.1%) but only 47.3% were fully staffed all 12 months. One-person centers comprised 1.8% of the sample, a slight decrease from 2.4% in the 2023-2024 survey. The average clinical full-time equivalent (FTE) for all institutions except community colleges was 9.1 FTE, while the average for community colleges was 5.3 FTE.

Remote work. Only 39% of respondents answered the question regarding whether clinical staff were allowed to work remotely. Of responding centers, 95.8% reported that at least some staff were allowed some remote work on a routine basis without remote work being part of formal workplace accommodation. However, these positive responses represent 37.8% of the total survey sample and should not be interpreted to mean that most centers allow for remote work. For those centers allowing remote work, on average, staff are expected to be on-site 74.6% of the work week.

Budget. The 2024-2025 survey revisited the topic of center budgets. Less than half (42.2%) of participants provided usable data for the item regarding overall center budget. During the data cleaning process, the survey team identified that a number of directors are only given access to operational and professional development fund budgets but are not privy to salary and benefits budgets.

Total budgets ranged widely and typically covaried with size of institution, with smaller schools having smaller budgets. Considering all reporting centers, the mean total budget was \$1,610,236.12. In the larger report, center budget analyses are broken out by a number of subcategories.

The majority of centers (59.2%) reported a decrease in total budget from fiscal year 2024 (FY24) to fiscal year 2025 (FY25). When examined by type of institution only community colleges

(n=16) had a greater proportion of centers reporting budgets that stayed the same or increased (62.5%). With respect to different budget categories, 9.4% of schools reported a decrease in salary budget, 21.5% a decrease in operating budget, and 13.3% a decrease in professional development budget.

Interestingly, when examining budgets of four-year public colleges and universities relative to four-year private colleges and universities, directors at private institutions consistently reported budget decreases with greater frequency across all categories. For total budget, 72.8% of directors at private institutions reported a decrease in their budget, whereas only 49% of directors at public institutions reported a decrease. For operational budgets, 29% of privates and 13.6% of publics experienced a decrease. For professional development budgets, 15.6% of privates reported a decrease and only 9.3% of publics did. For salary budgets, very few privates or publics reported a budget decrease (10.8% and 8.9% respectively). However, only 39.6% of directors at private institutions reported an increase in their salary budgets while over half (52.5%) of directors at public institutions reported an increase in their salary budgets.

Billing. Billing of clients or insurance for services continues to be the exception rather than the rule, with only 11.3% of survey participants reporting their center bills for any service. For those centers that do bill, the most frequently billed service is psychiatry (65.2%), followed by ADHD/LD testing (45.7%), and then individual therapy (43.5%). The vast majority of centers also do not charge a no-show fee for individual therapy (78.5%) or psychiatric appointments (68%).

Impacts on academics. On average, 74.7% of clients reported that counseling services positively affected their academic performance and 71.4% reported that services positively influenced their ability to stay in school. These data confirm that counseling services have a positive impact on retention as well as academic performance.

First contact models. The majority of centers use scheduled first contacts and an intake process. However, 22.7% of responding centers use a drop-in/same day model for first contact with the center. In a third of responding centers (35.7%) the first session a student has in the center is a therapy appointment rather than a screening or intake process that precedes the start of therapy.

Electronic Health Record systems. The majority (60.3%) of centers reported using Titanium as their Electronic Health Record (EHR), followed by Point & Click (13.8%), and Mediat (12.8%). Overall, regardless of EHR, directors reported being satisfied with their center's EHR system (66.3% satisfied or highly satisfied). The most commonly cited reasons for choosing a particular EHR were that it was designed for counseling centers (52.7%), cost considerations (46.2%), and ease of use (43.6%).

Director Information

Demographics. The majority of directors identified as cis-gender women (72.0%); 1.4% identified outside of the gender binary. The majority of directors (82.9%) identified as heterosexual. With respect to race, directors were presented with a number of potential identity categories and invited to check all categories that are aligned with their identities. Directors were also provided with a write-in option if the presented categories did not

accurately capture how they identify. Slightly over a third (36.8%) of directors endorsed identities within the BIPOC community. Slightly over half (54.6%) of responding directors labeled their professional identity as related to psychology. The next most frequent was counseling (30%) and then social work (11.8%). Directors with doctoral degrees comprised 62.9% of the sample; 37.1% of directors reported holding a terminal master's degree.

Experience. Nearly 7% of respondents reported being in their first year as a director, up from 3.7% in the 2023-2024 survey. In total, 54.9% of respondents have been a director for 5 years or less. Examining reported years of experience as a director across the last 18 years, the percentage of directors with less than 5-6 years of experience in the role has generally hovered around 50%. Beginning in 2016-2017, the percentage of relatively new directors began to consistently stay above 50%; it has approached 60% but never quite reached this threshold. The percentage of directors with more than 16 years in the role has steadily declined since 2013-2014, with half the number of seasoned directors in the current sample (12%) as in 2013-2014 (24.1%). Directors who reported 16 or more years of professional experience after their terminal degree comprised 58.1% of the sample. The majority (82.4%) of directors worked in higher education prior to taking on the director's role.

Months worked per year. The vast majority (88.4%) of directors are contracted to work 12 months out of the year, regardless of the size of institution at which they work. No director working on a campus with 20,001 enrollment or more reported holding less than a 12-month contract.

Supervisors. Approximately one-quarter (24.4%) of directors reported experiencing a supervisor change between 2024-2025. The most frequent professional background of supervisors of counseling center directors is student affairs (60.6%), followed far behind (14.4%) by a mental health background.

Directors were asked to rate how well their supervisors understood counseling center work. The majority of directors felt their supervisors understood the work to at least some extent (understands some 15.7%; generally understands 52.7%; understands completely 24.9%). When looking at degree of understanding by professional background of the supervisor, perhaps predictably supervisors with professional backgrounds as higher education administrators (not student affairs), faculty, and "other" had lowest understanding ratings.

Directors were also asked what areas of counseling center work/needs lead to regular difficult dialogues with their supervisors. A significant minority (35.6%) reported they do not have regular difficult dialogues with their supervisors. Areas of reported tension included adequate salary/compensation for staff (42.6%), importance of paid CEs for staff (18.5%), level of sharing confidential information with supervisor (17.4%) and counseling staff attendance at events "just in case someone is upset" (17.4%), among others.

Service Demand

Students using services. The percentage of campus that uses counseling services varies widely across institutions. In particular, small schools tend to see more of the student population than large schools. For example, the range for schools under 1,501 enrollment was 4.2% to 35.3%, with an average of 16.3% of eligible students served. By contrast, schools with more than

45,000 eligible students, percent of the population served ranged from 4.2% to 15.5%, with an average of 7%. Across institutions other than community colleges, the average number of students who attended at least one appointment at the counseling center was 950.6; for community colleges the average was 620.9. When one-person centers were excluded from these analyses, the means increased to 980.3 and 673.6 respectively.

Clinical Load Index. For the seventh year in a row, the Clinical Load Index (CLI) was calculated for each center that provided the necessary data. Calculating the CLI helps evaluate and compare counseling center clinical resources, accounting for demand and true clinical capacity. The average CLI for 2024-2025 was 94.5 for all institutions except community colleges and 111.2 for community colleges. These numbers represent a slight decrease in CLI for institutions other than community colleges (99.4 in 2023-2024) and a slight increase for community colleges (108.9 in 2023-2024). Once again, the mean CLI calculated for the AUCCCD Director Survey mirrored the mean CLI (mean CLI 93) published by the Center for Collegiate Mental Health, the originators of the CLI (Locke, Scofield, Janis, & Cummins, 2024).

Wait time for appointments. Average wait times for first contact, excluding centers with a drop-in/same day model for first contact, was 5.4 days, including weekends. Average wait times for a student's first therapy appointment was 7.9 days, including weekends. This average included all institutions. Looking at centers where the first contact is also the first therapy appointment, the average wait time was 6.1 days. These times are not significantly different from the 2023-2024 survey.

Change in demand. For institutions other than community colleges, 48.9% reported an increase in demand compared to 2023-2024, while 46.1% reported a decrease in demand, and 4.9% reported no change in demand. For community colleges, 48% reported an increase in demand, 40% reported a decrease, and 12% reported no change from the previous year. Overall, community colleges in this sample appear to be equally split between growing demand (48%) and steady or decreasing demand (52%), while other types of institutions are still largely holding steady or experiencing decreasing demand (51.1%) rather than increasing demand (48.9%).

In terms of appointments provided, the majority (54.4%) of centers – regardless of institution type – experienced an increase in number of attended appointments during the 2024-2025 reporting year. Of community colleges, 54.3% reported an increase in appointments provided. This percentage was 56.3% for institutions other than community colleges.

Managing demand. Nearly all participants (80.8%) reported that their centers have difficulty meeting the demand for services. Generally speaking, counseling centers at larger institutions more frequently endorsed difficulty meeting demand than centers at smaller institutions. The two most frequent strategies centers reported using to meet demand were scheduling most or all appointments biweekly (57%) and using a triage system (51.1%). At a distant third were referring more students off campus (28.1%) and developing a waitlist (28.1%). Centers then reported contracting with a vendor to provide teletherapy (25.8%), using a stepped care model (25.3%), and reducing outreach activities to make more clinical time available (25%).

Clinical Services Provided

Total appointments provided. Across all clinical services, institutions other than community colleges provided, on average, 5,186.9 appointments during the reporting period, with clients receiving an average of 6.2 clinical appointments each. Community colleges, on average, provided 2,655.2 appointments, with clients receiving an average of 5.3 clinical appointments each. As with percentage of eligible students served, the number of appointments provided by counseling centers covary with the size of the institution and covary widely within each enrollment band. Although not examined statistically in this report, it is likely center model influences the number of appointments provided. For example, centers with a robust group therapy program will generate more appointments in a year than centers that only provide group therapy.

Individual therapy. In terms of individual therapy (excluding intakes, crisis, psychiatric appointments), community colleges provided an average of 1,611.3 appointments to 341.9 unique clients. Other institutions provided an average of 3,502.2 individual therapy appointments to 672.9 unique clients. Across all institutions, clients attended an average of 5.6 individual therapy appointments. Across the last nine years, the average number of individual therapy appointments attended per client has varied little, with the lowest average at 4.6 and the highest at 6 appointments. With respect to unattended appointments, the average center no show rate for individual therapy was 7.7%, 8.4% for cancellations, and 6.3% for rescheduled appointments.

Triage/screening services. Many centers (59.2%) use some triage or screening process as their first contact with new clients. For centers using this model there appears to be a tendency to emphasize access by offering clients choices, with 45% of centers offering both unscheduled and scheduled appointments and 47.2% of centers offering a variety of modalities for completing the triage appointment.

Group therapy. For all institutions, 70.7% reported offering group therapy services. Community Colleges in this sample were less likely to provide group therapy (40%) than other types of institutions (72.5%). In general, larger institutions were more likely to report having group programs, but only very small institutions (under 1,501) were significantly less likely to host group therapy programs (37.5%). It appears there is a subset of centers that offer groups but were unable to recruit students to participate (4.5%). These centers tended to be smaller schools, with all but two at institutions with enrollments of 7,500 or less. Number of clients participating in group therapy across all responding centers ranged significantly from 2 to 514 clients.

Crisis services. The majority of centers reported they are able to track the number of clients seen in the center for crisis (75.6%) and the number of crisis appointments provided (79.2%). Of those centers that track these data, an average of 113.5 clients were provided with an average of 156.2 crisis appointments. The majority (67.4%) of centers use third party vendors to provide after-hours crisis support to students, followed by community crisis lines (40.8%).

Reflecting the largely urban location of participating centers, over three-quarters of centers have a behavioral health hospital within 10 miles of campus (79.6%). By-and-large, centers reported having more difficulty determining how many center clients were referred for

evaluation for hospitalization, were hospitalized, and, of those hospitalized, how many were involuntary commitments.

For those centers who track this information, an average of 12.3 clients were referred for evaluation, an average of 8.4 were hospitalized, and an average of 2.8 were hospitalized involuntarily. For the small number of centers that track whether clients take a medical leave (n=91), an average of 16.1 clients took a medical leave of absence during 2024-2025.

As with all other “volume” variables, these crises variable covary with institution size, with centers at larger institutions reporting higher numbers than centers at smaller institutions, though there is significant variability within size bands. However, regardless of size of institution, crisis work is, on average, a relatively low percentage of a center’s appointments (1.5% - 3.9%) and hospitalizations are an even smaller percentage of the work. At the same time, the toll crisis work takes on centers and their staff should not be underestimated. Even though it is a low frequency event, crisis appointments – particularly those leading to hospitalizations – are stressful, time-consuming clinical situations that can disrupt other services and contribute to staff burnout.

Psychiatric services. The sample was fairly evenly split between campuses that have no psychiatric services (35.6%), psychiatric services outside of the counseling center (28.2%), and psychiatric services within the counseling center only or within the center and elsewhere on campus (36.2%). For those centers that provide psychiatric services, an average of 213.7 clients received this service, an average of 967.3 psychiatric appointments were provided, and clients received an average of 4.1 appointments. With respect to unattended appointments, average center no show rate for psychiatric appointments was 9.2%, 7.1% for cancellations, and 5.7% for rescheduled appointments.

Outreach and Campus Community Education

Types of outreach and training. The most frequently endorsed type of outreach was tabling at events (94.5%), followed by consultation to concerned others (89.4%), serving on institutional committees (86.3%), programming for the general student body (86.1%), programming for students in a particular department or area (83.7%), and programming for students in residence life/housing (77.9%).

Reach of outreach and training. Responding centers reported providing training to an average of 437.2 individuals and providing outreach to an average of 3,630.9 individuals.

Relationship with Student Health Services

Proximity and collaboration. Counseling Centers and Student Health Services share the same building for 52.9% of respondents. For another 31% of centers, the two services are within a 10 minute or less walk of each other. The majority of centers (88.5%) reported at least some degree of collaboration between counseling and health, and 83.6% described the collaboration as effective to very effective. Degree and quality of collaboration did not appear to vary significantly based on proximity of the counseling center to health services.

Integration with Health Services. Separate counseling and health services is still the most prevalent model (57.5%) across participating campuses, but a significant proportion of centers are partially (16%) or fully (16.7%) integrated with health services. For fully integrated centers, the chief administrator is most likely an Executive Director or AVP (53.6%), followed by the counseling center director (23.2%). For both partially (74.2%) and fully (85.5%) integrated centers, it is very common to share an electronic health record system. Fully integrated centers were much more likely to share records between counseling and health staff without separate consent from the client (64.7%) than partially integrated centers (28.8%).

Staff Turnover and Recruitment

Staff turnover. Staff turnover continued to be a challenge for Directors to manage. On average, 25.2% of all non-trainee clinical positions and 25.1% of all non-trainee positions turned over in fiscal year 2024-2025, a significant increase from 2023-2024 data. As for the past several years, the top reason given for staff leaving during 2024-2025 was low salary (46.5%). The most frequently cited second and third reasons this year were relocation (38.3%) and work conditions (36.3%). Moving to private practice continued to be the most frequent (39.8%) next professional step for departing staff.

Staff recruitment. For this survey period, directors were evenly split among those who reported having no open positions (34.8%), those who reported no difficulty recruiting for open positions (30.3%) and those who reported difficulty with recruiting new staff (34.8%). The frequency of reported difficulty with recruitment is down from 48.6% in the 2023-2024 survey. In 2024-2025, the average pool for doctoral positions had 2.4 applicants while masters' positions had 9 applicants and open degree postings averaged 8.3 applicants. Short-term hiring solutions to fill one or more permanent positions were used by 25.6% of reporting centers.

Teletherapy Vendor Use and Satisfaction with Utilization

Use. Contracting with third-party vendors to provide one or more routine service was reported by 45.8% of responding community colleges and 63.5% of all other institution types. These frequencies are up slightly over 10% above the 2023-2024 frequencies for both categories of institutions. The average number of students served by a vendor was 432.6, but this appeared to vary widely across institutions of similar sizes. The most frequently contracted services were crisis (94%), individual therapy (84.7%), self-help content (72.5%), and psychiatry (54.6%).

Satisfaction with third-party vendor utilization. For most types of vendor-provided services, utilization was typically less than what directors expected. Of the different services provided by teletherapy vendors, only psychiatry and crisis services met or exceeded directors' utilization expectations. For psychiatry services, 43.4% of respondents reported utilization was about what they hoped and 20.5% reported utilization was more than they hoped for a total of 63.9% utilization satisfaction rating. For crisis services, 57.1% of respondents reported utilization was about what they hoped and 5.9% reported utilization was more than they hoped for a total of 63% utilization satisfaction rating. For all other types of vendor services, the majority of respondents (60.9% to 83.1%) indicated utilization of the service was less than they hoped it would be.

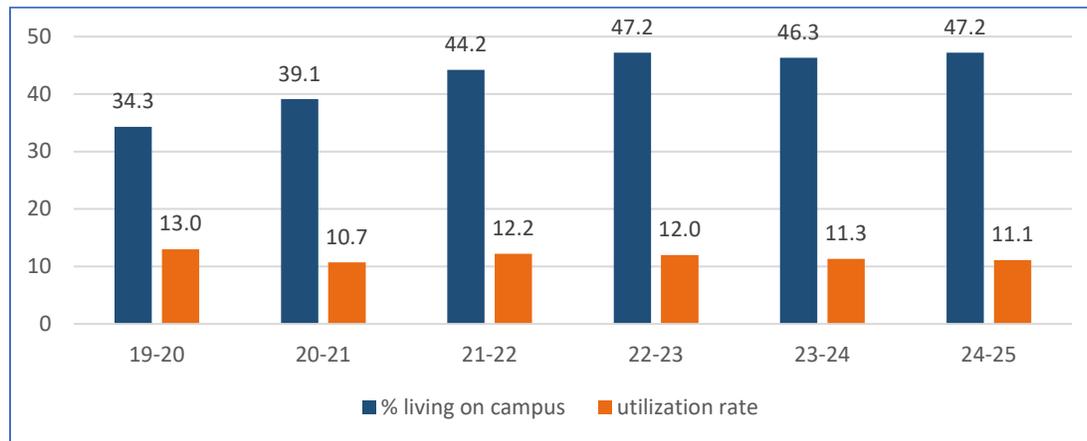

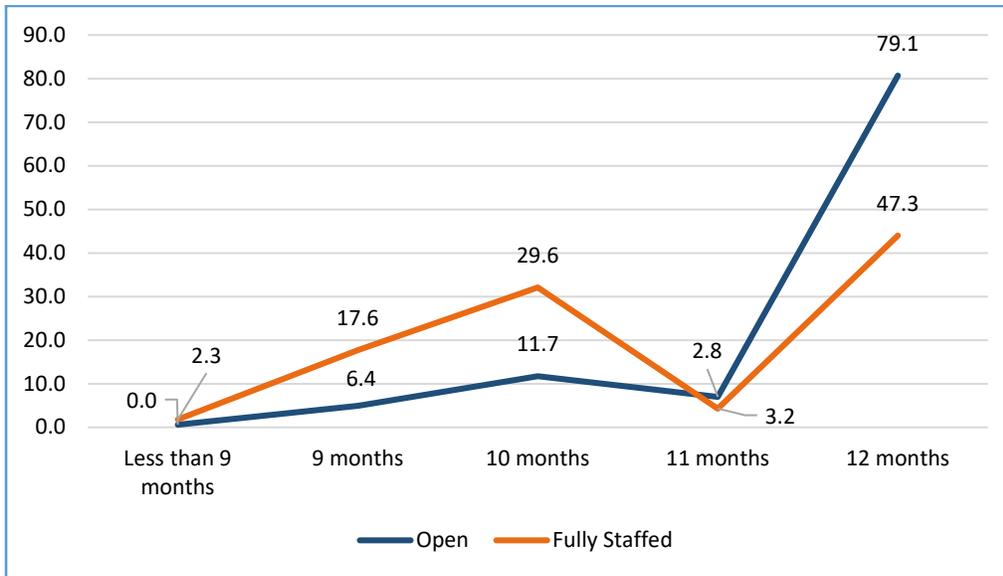

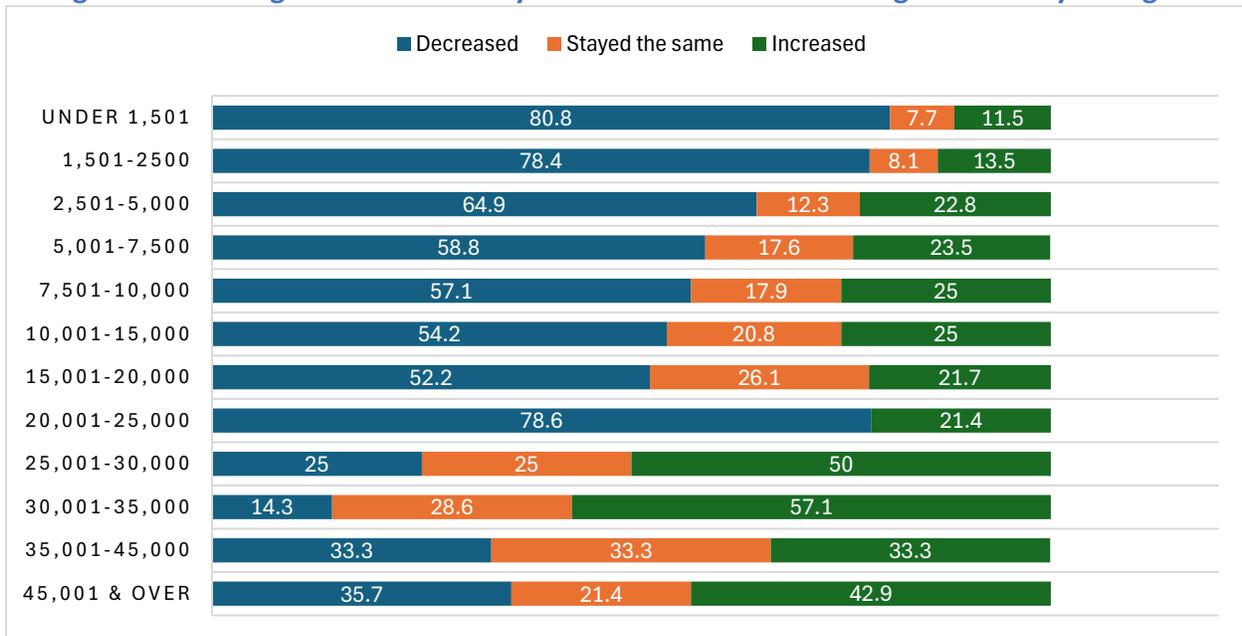

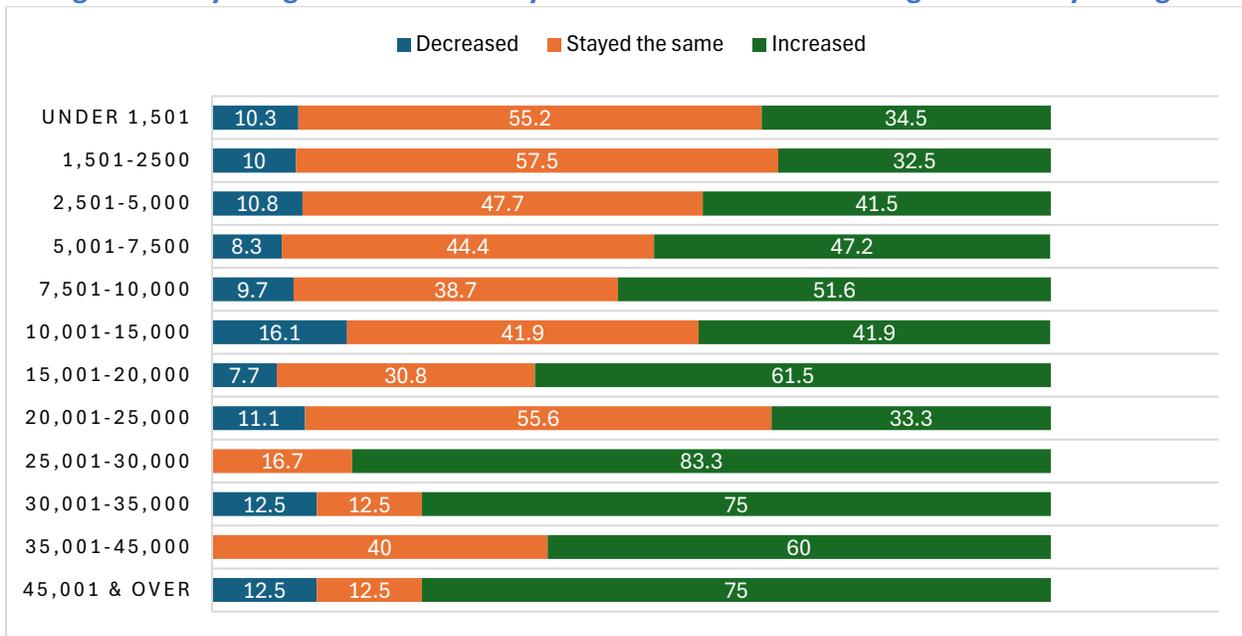

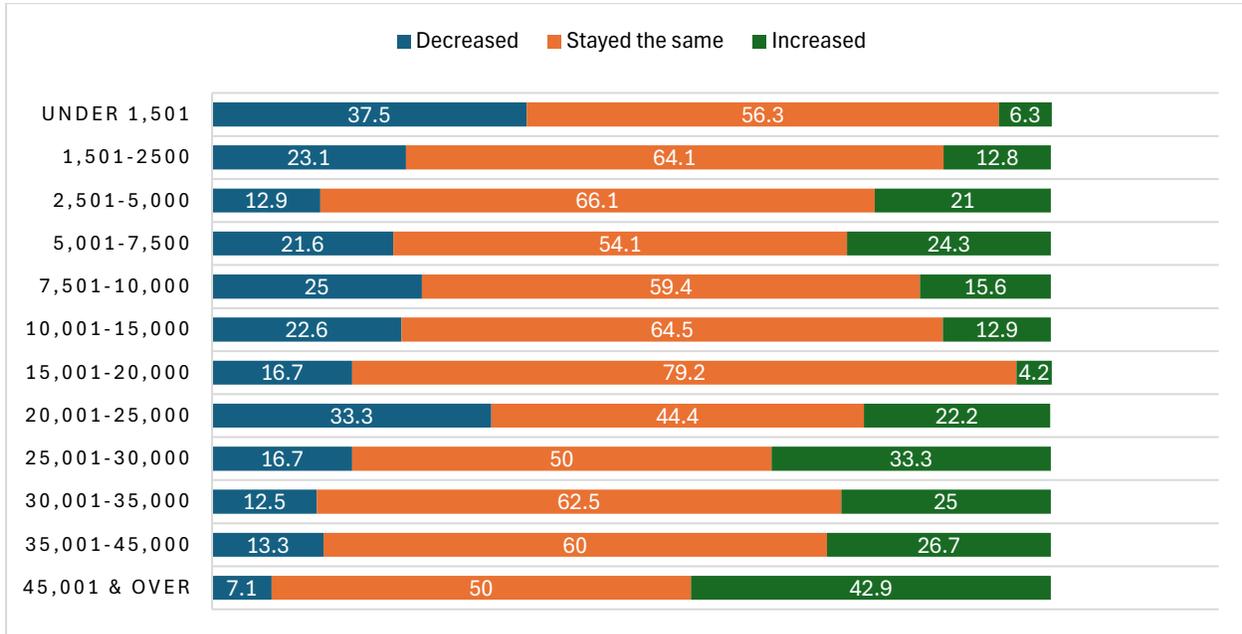

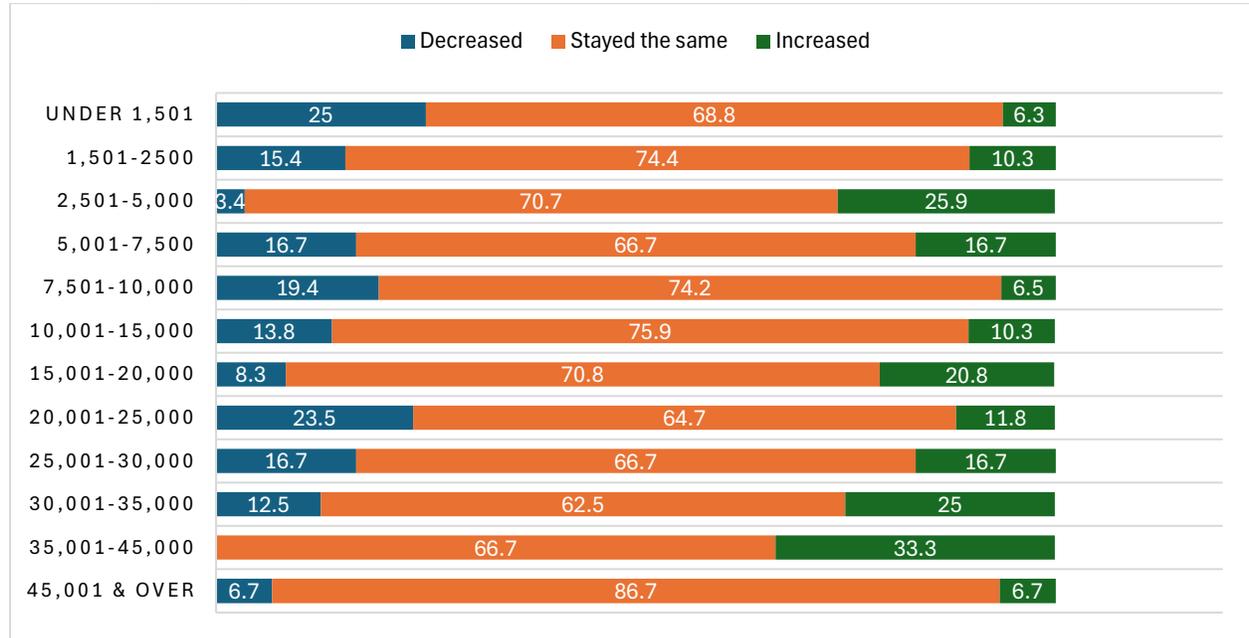

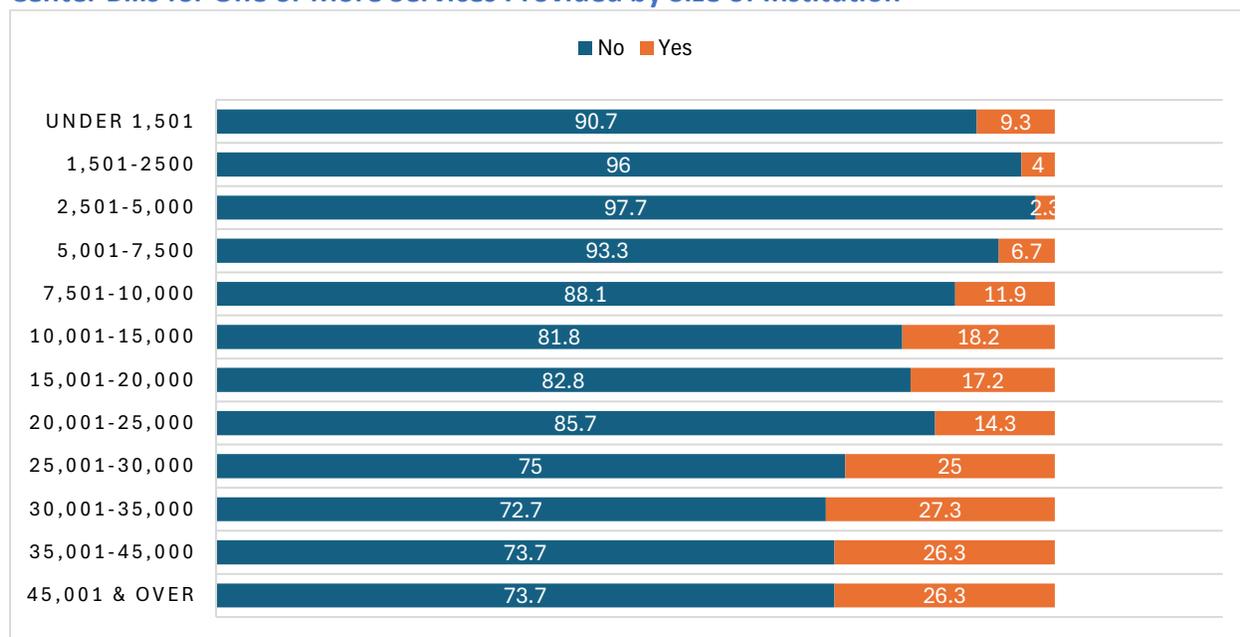

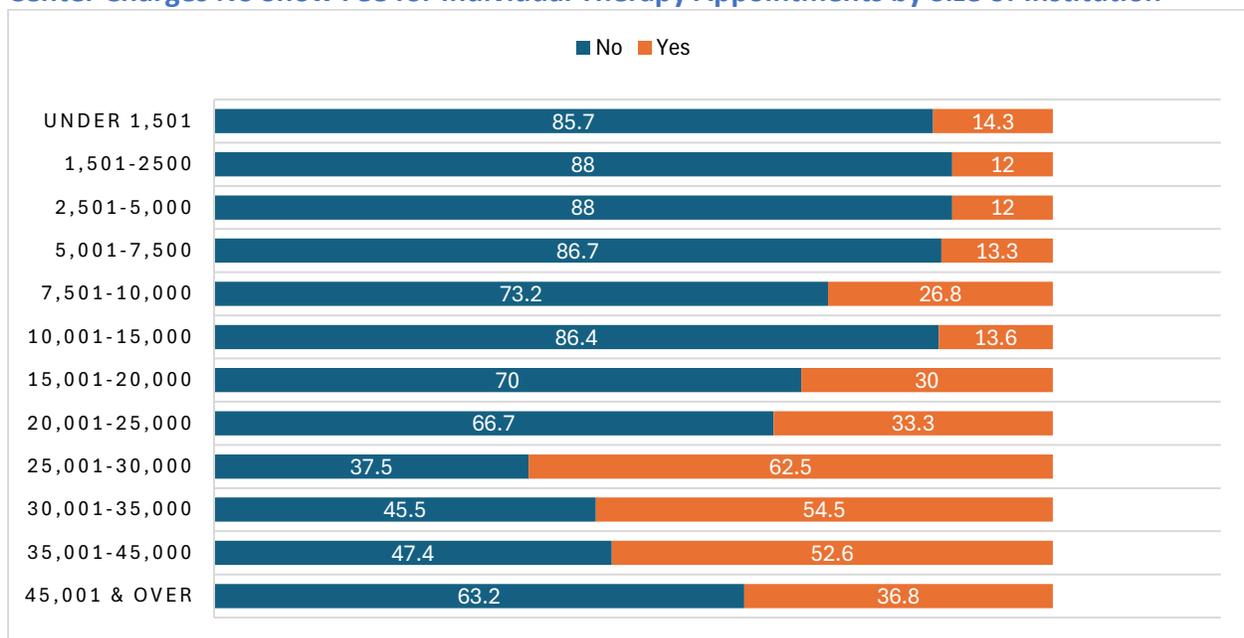

Center Charges No Show Fee for Individual Therapy Appointments by Size of Institution



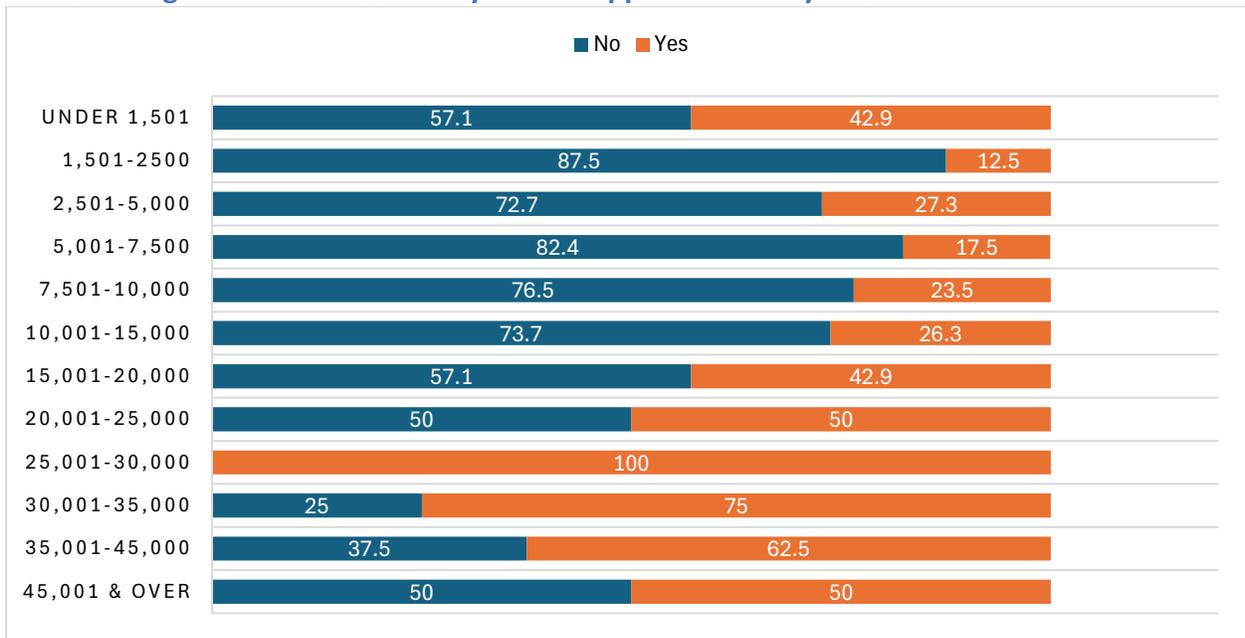

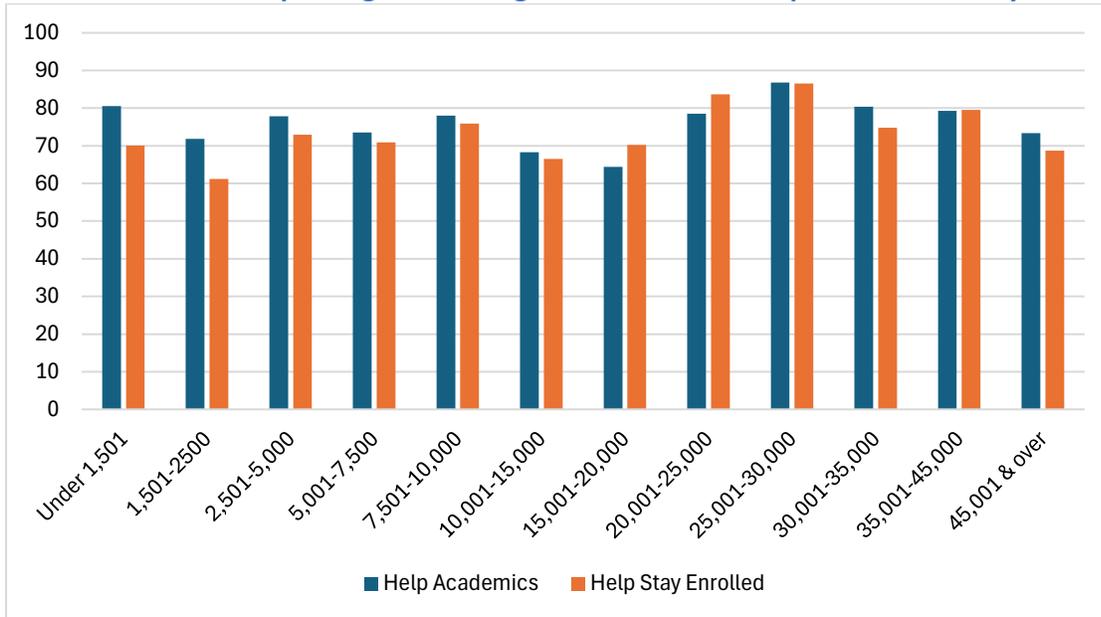

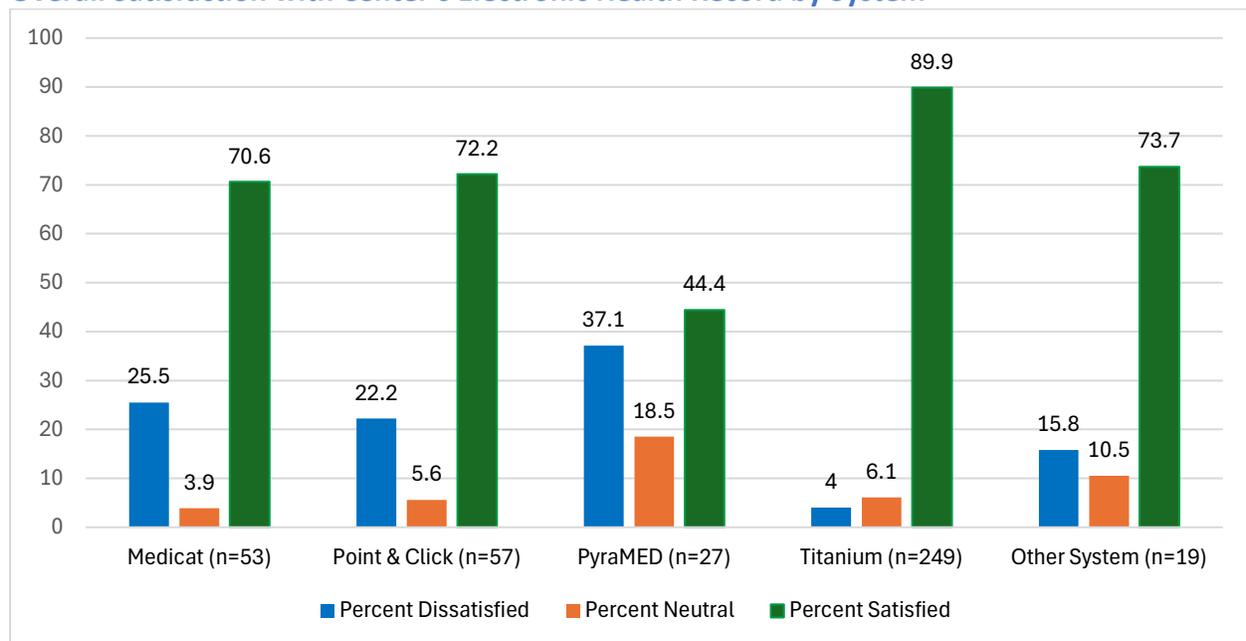

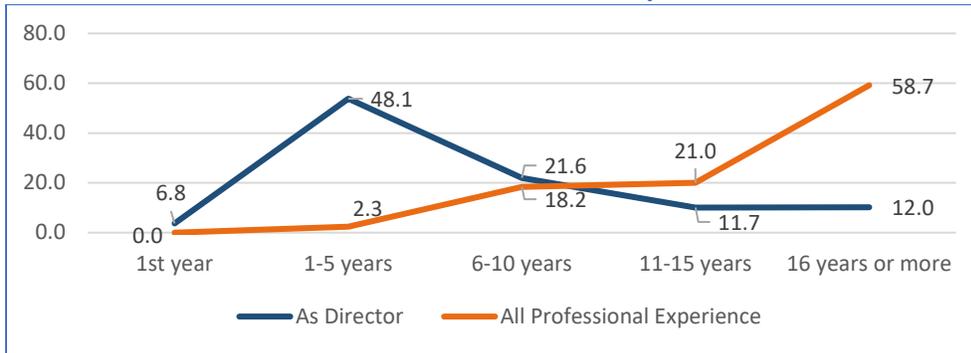

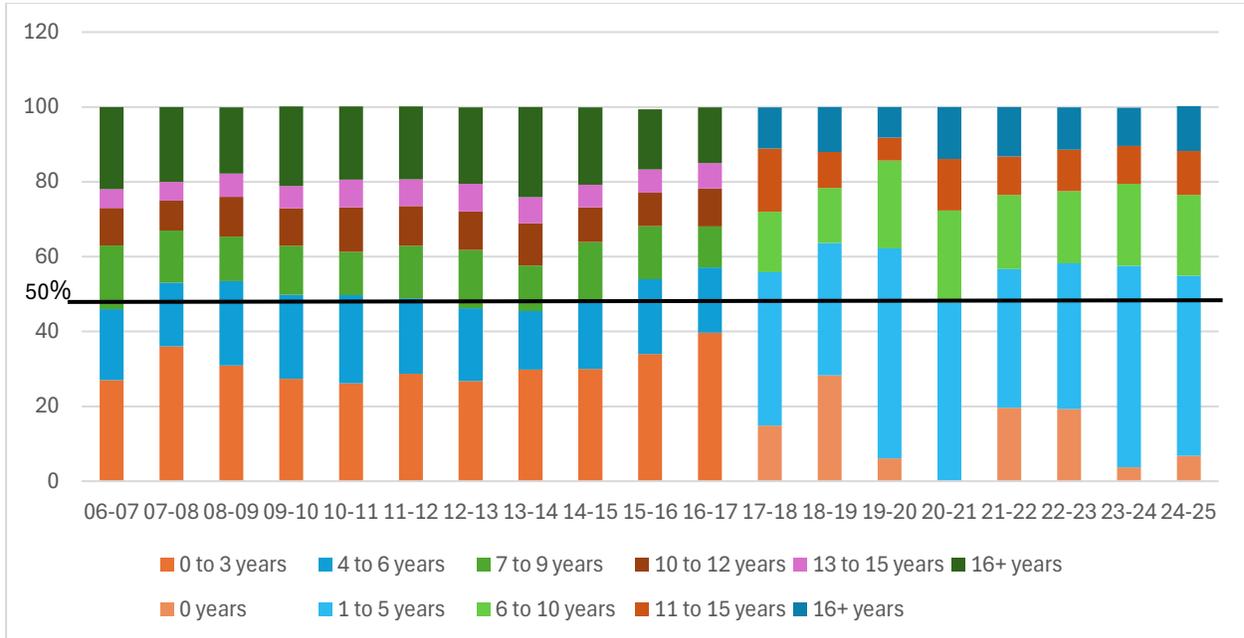

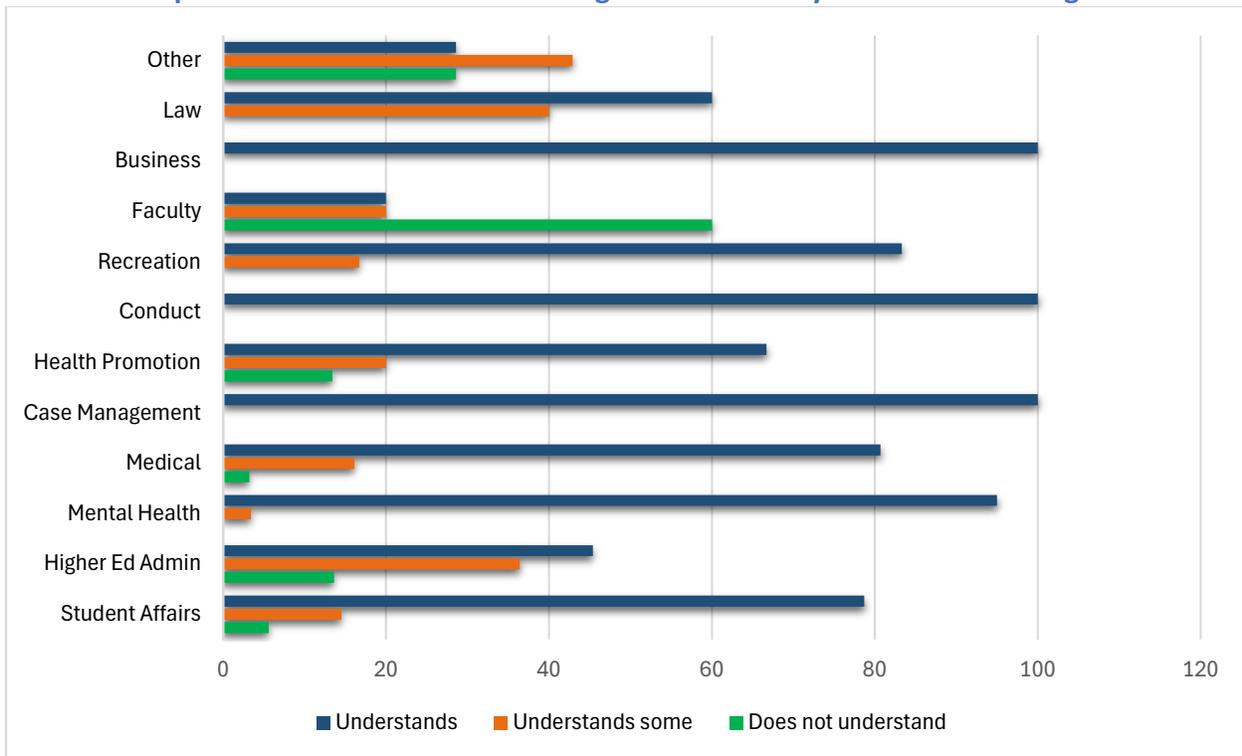

Percent of Students Served: Community Colleges Only

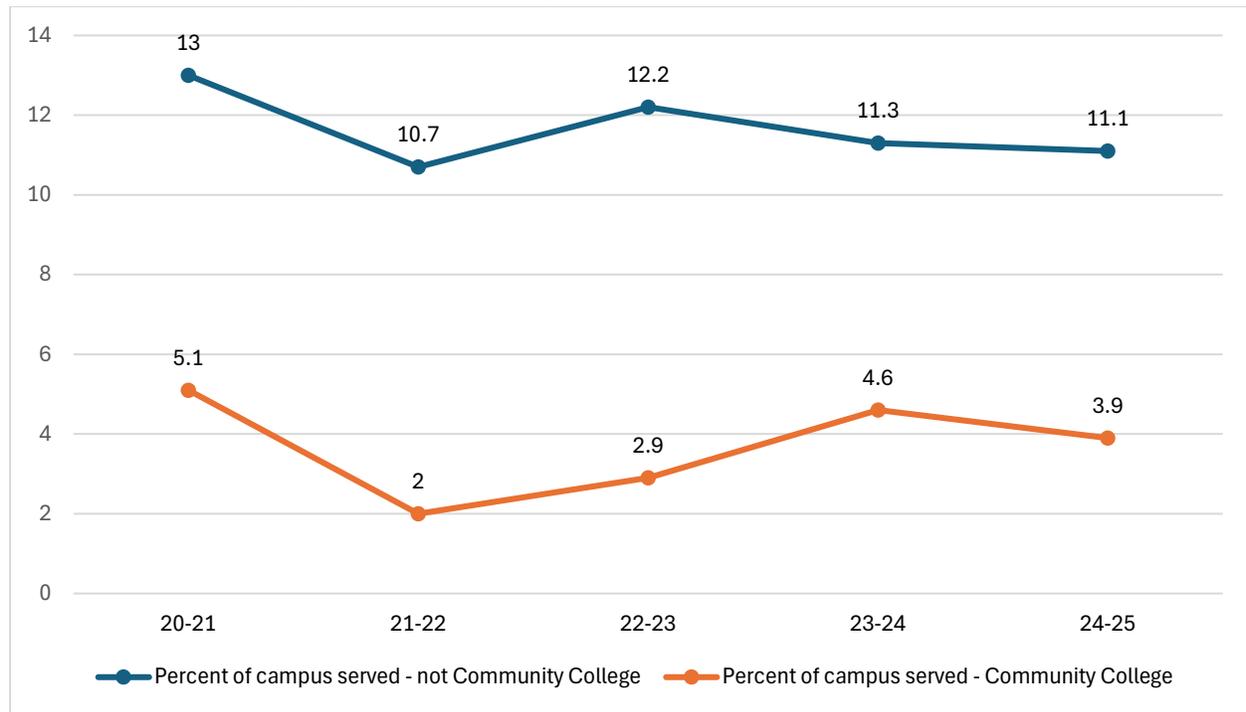

Clinical Load Index

Clinical Load Index (CLI) is a measurement created by the Center for Collegiate Mental Health (Locke, Scofield, Janis, & Cummins, 2024). It represents the standardized caseload of the counseling center. It takes into account that not every clinical staff person sees an equal caseload due to other responsibilities, hours worked per week, etc., and standardizes a caseload across the center. For example, in the table below, the mean CLI of 94.5 means each standardized counselor would have been responsible for about 95 clients over the course of the year.

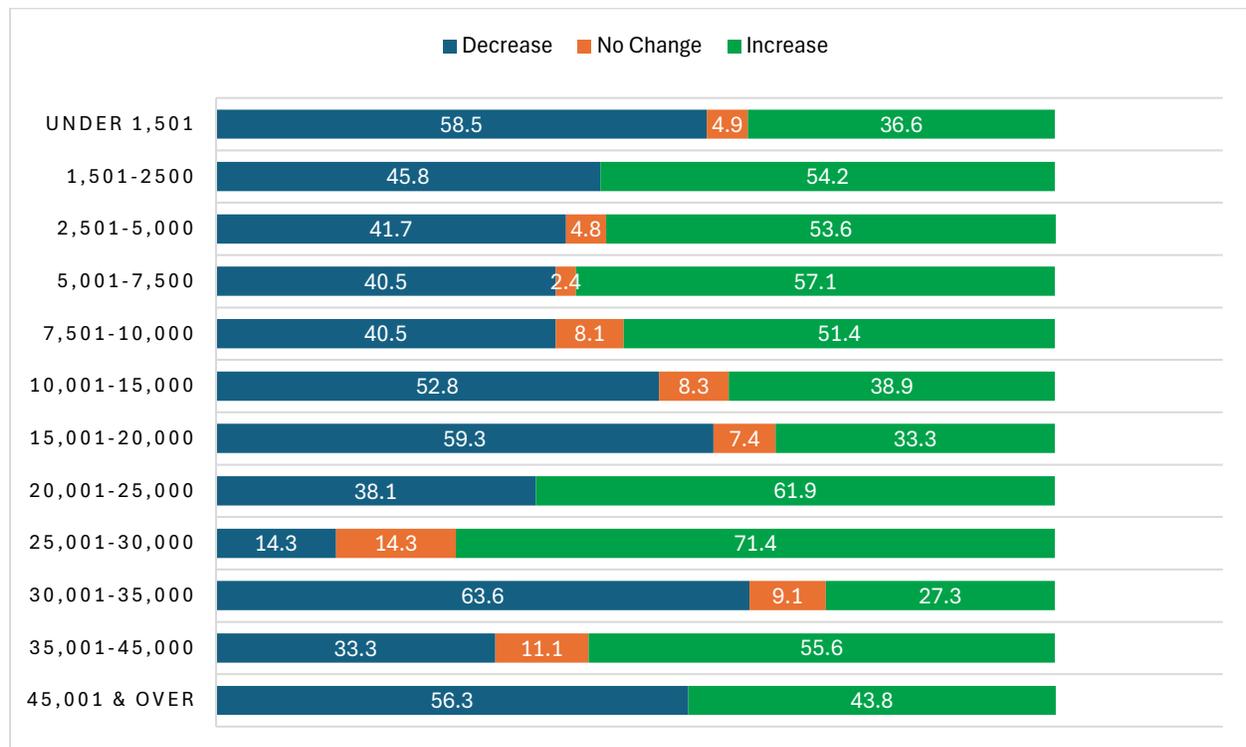

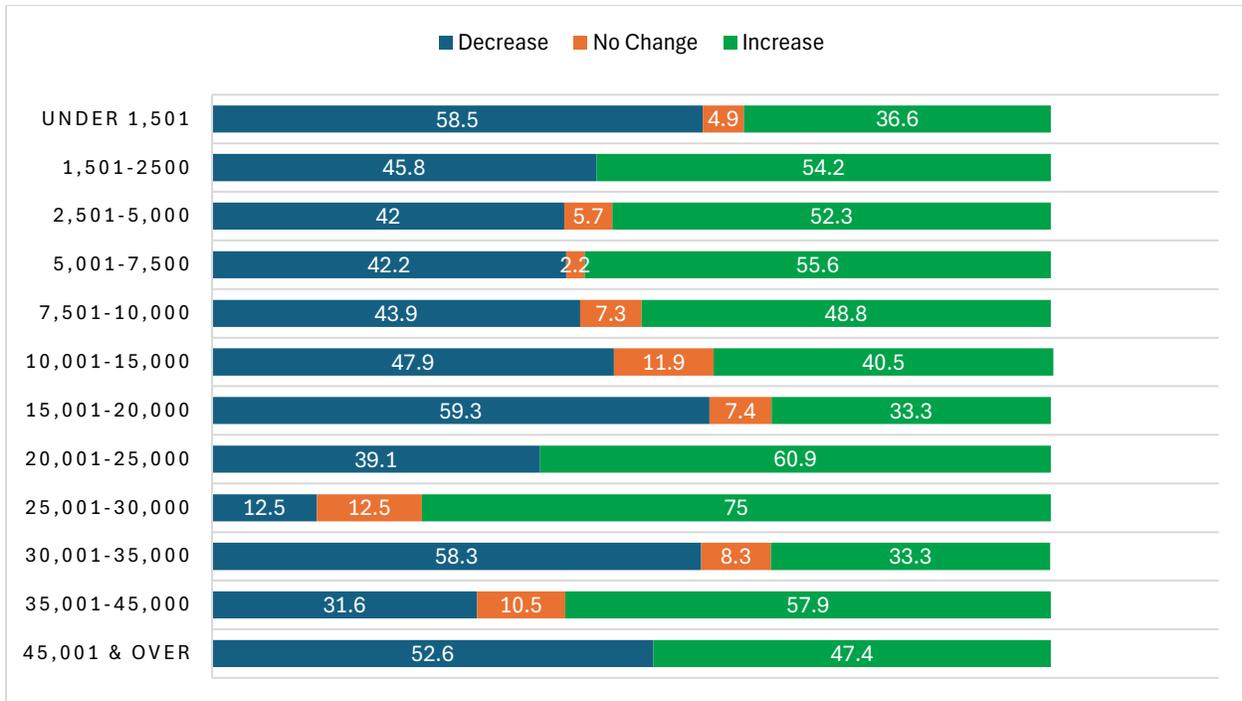

Percent of Centers Experiencing a Change in the Number of Unique Clients Center Served by Size of Institution: All Institutions

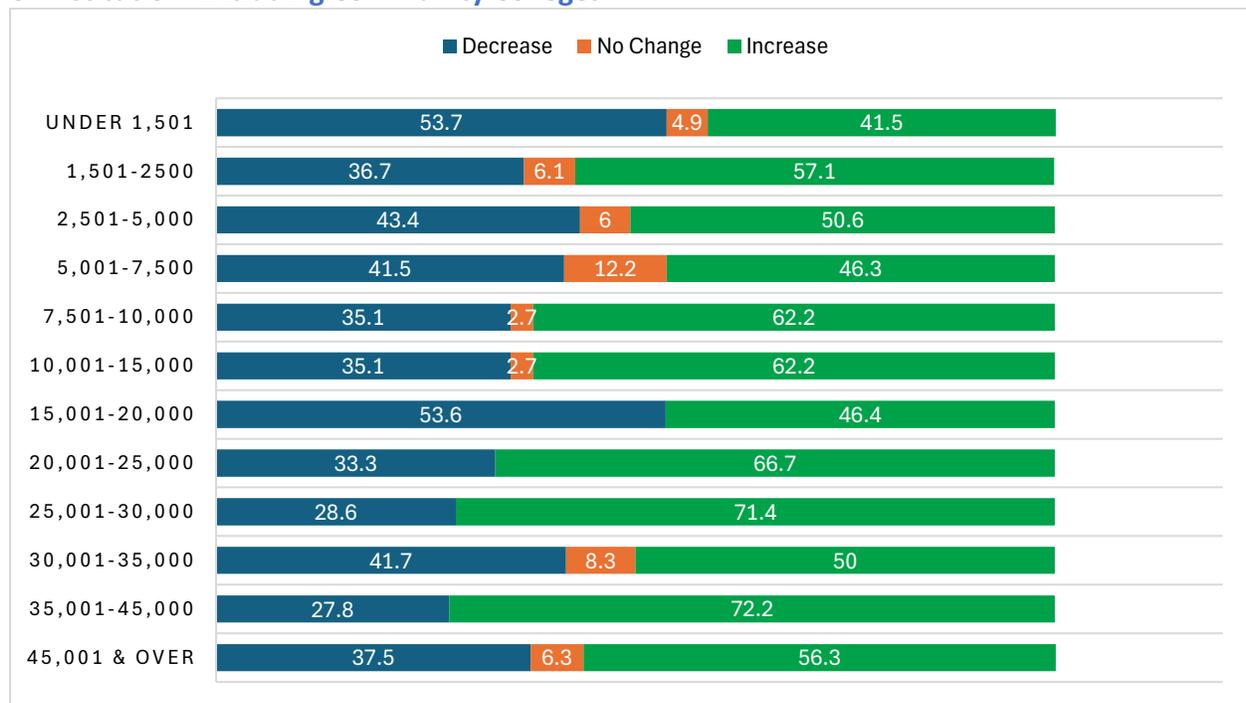

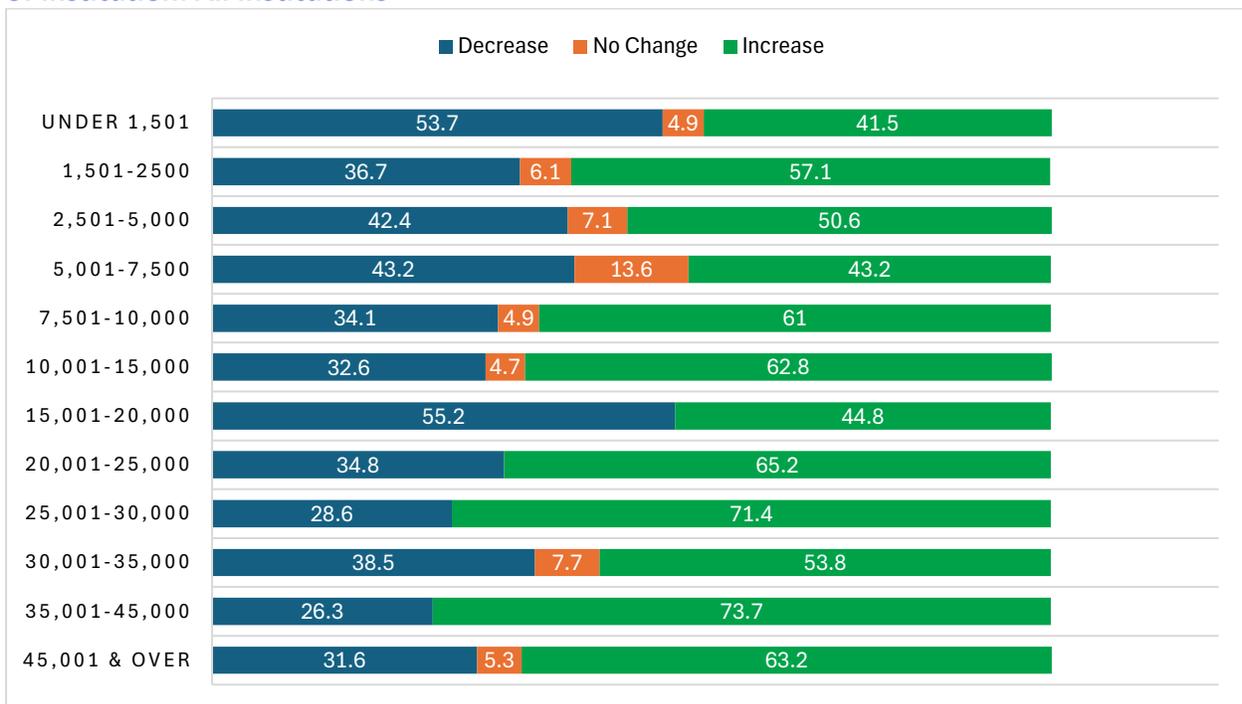

Change in Number of Attended Appointments for All Types of Clinical Services: All Institutions

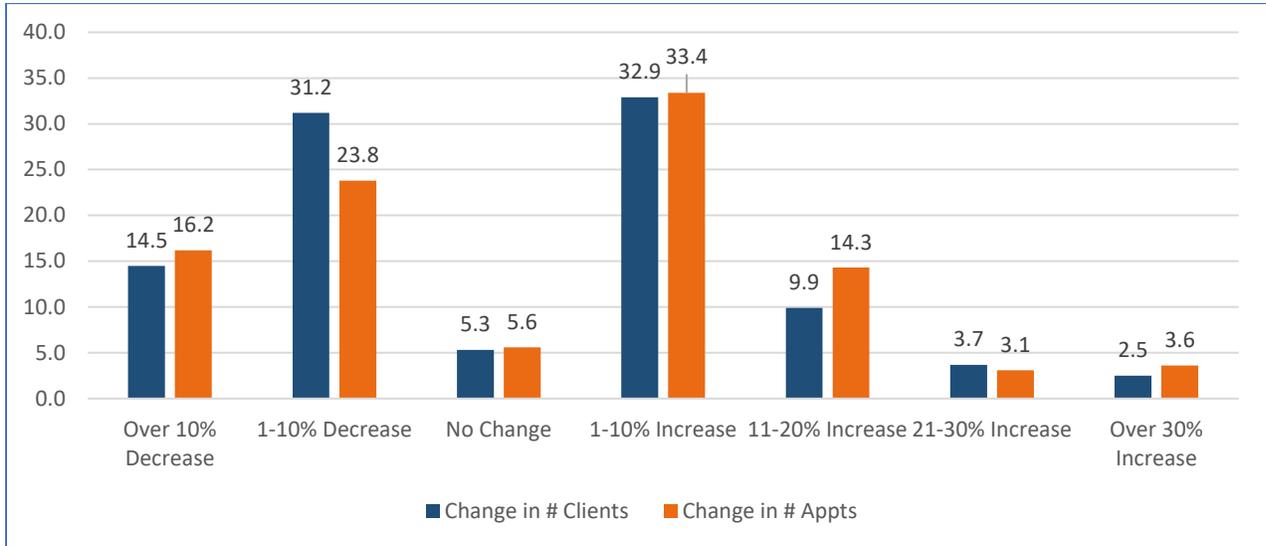

Percent of Centers with Utilization Changes in Number of Clients and Number of Appointments



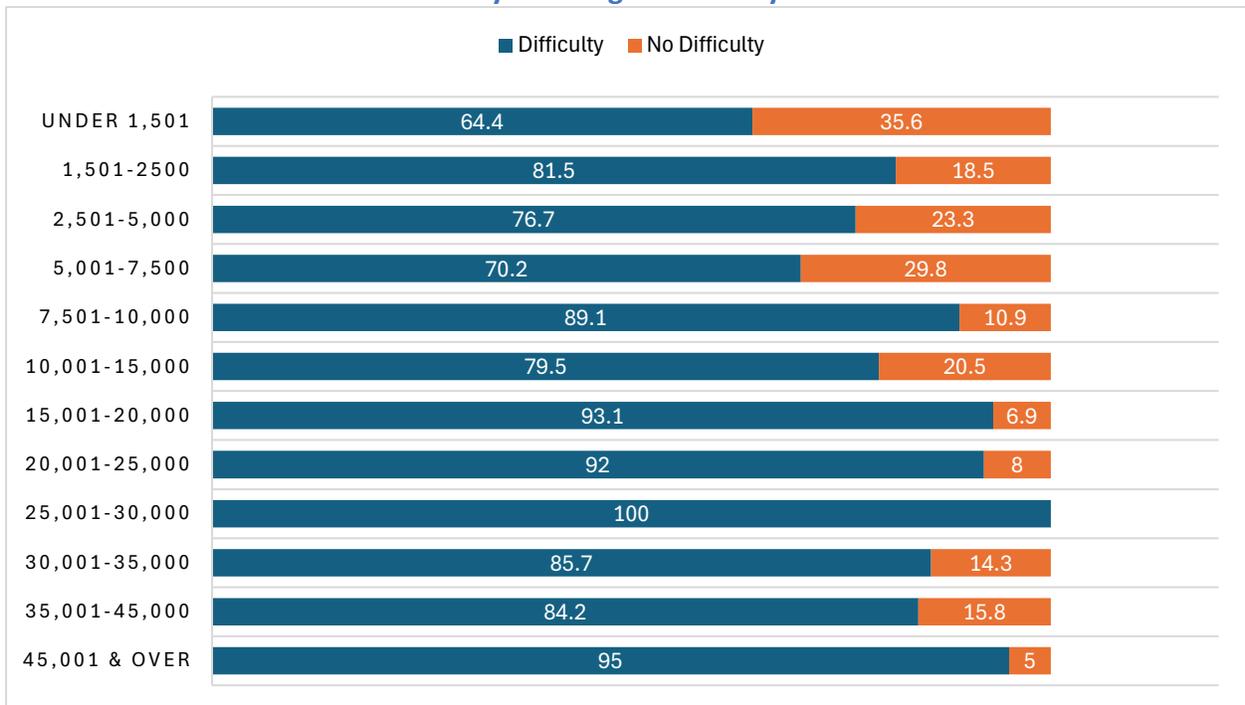

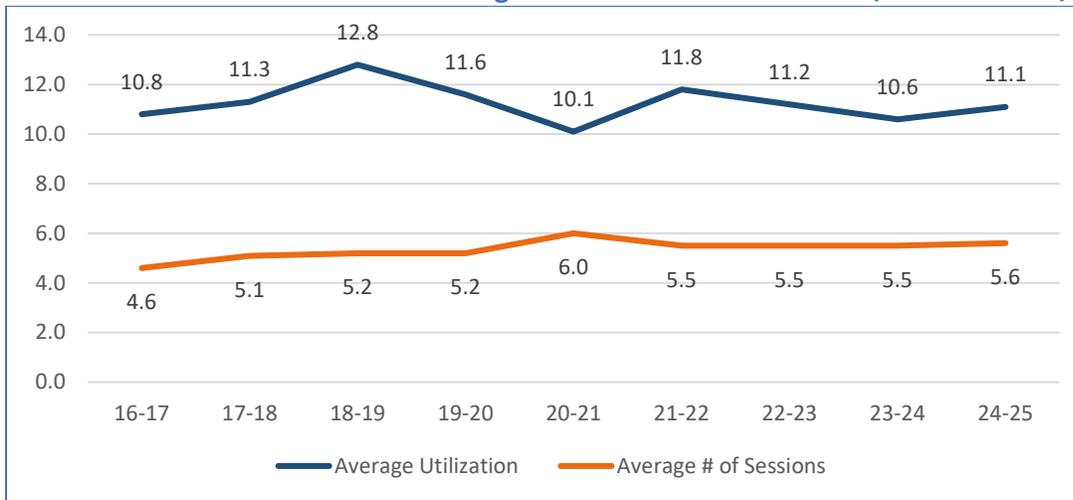

Percentage of Individual Therapy Appointments Rescheduled by Clients

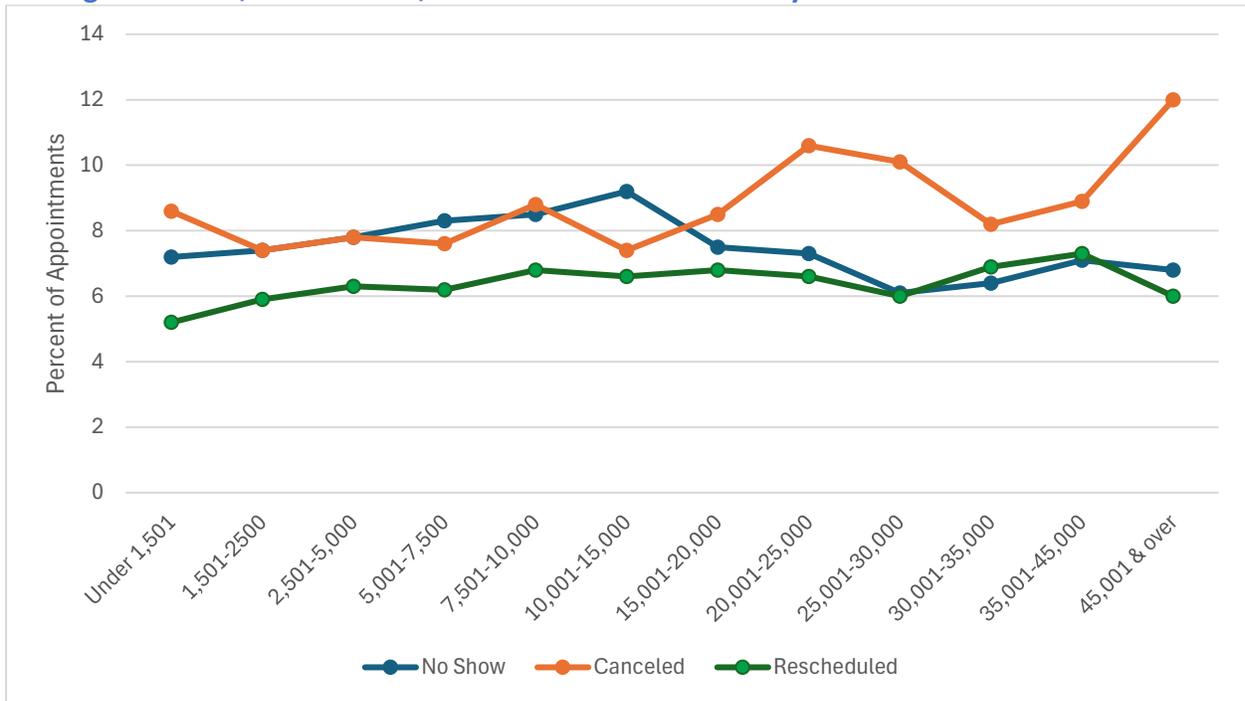

Average No Show, Cancellation, and Reschedule Percents by School Size



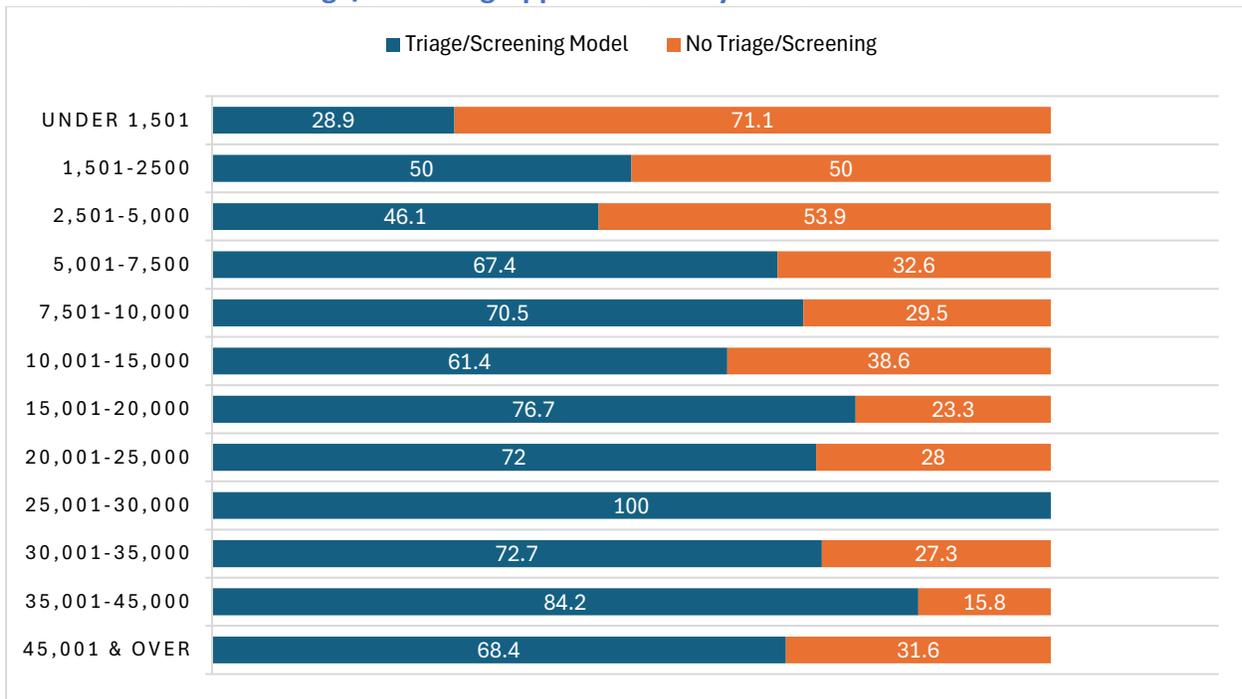

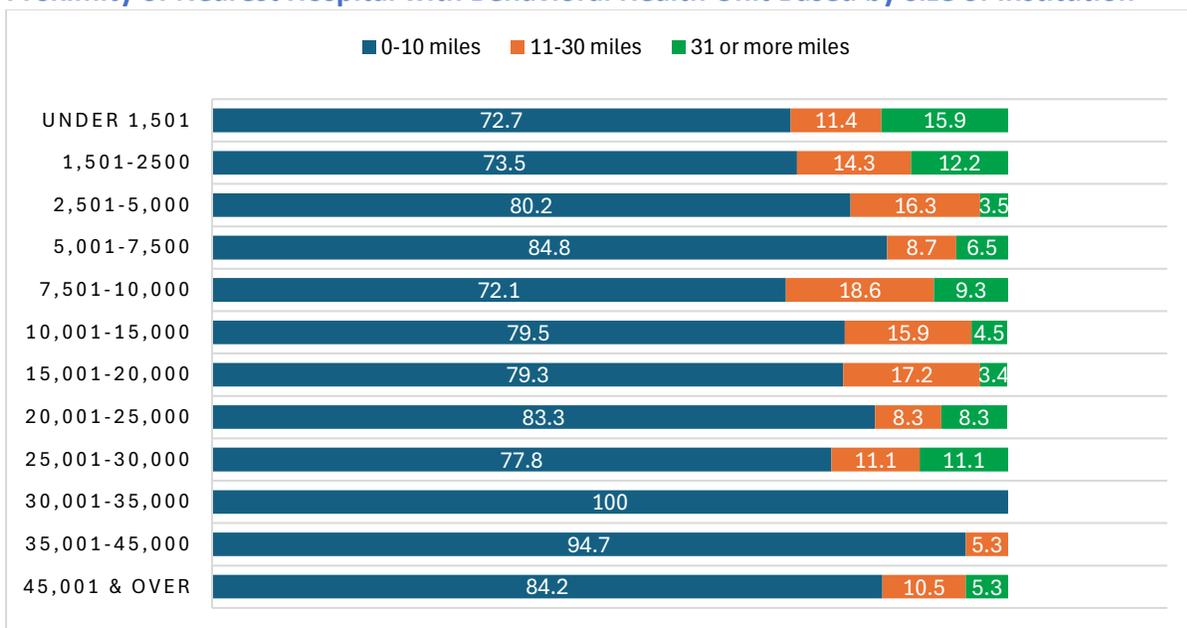

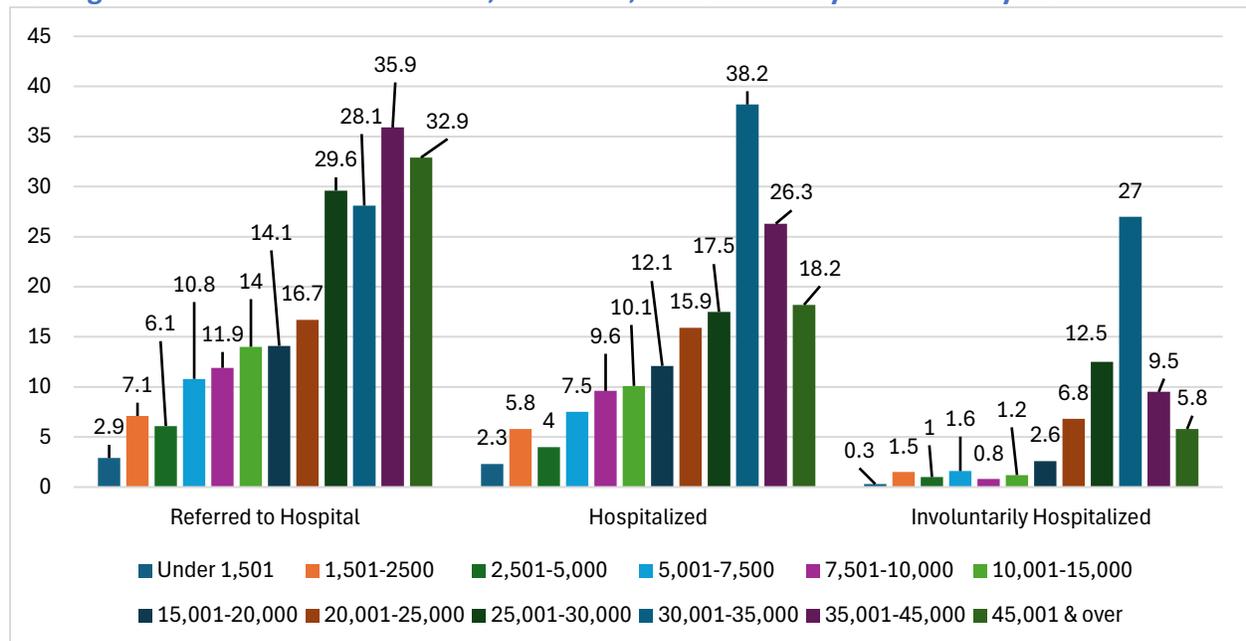

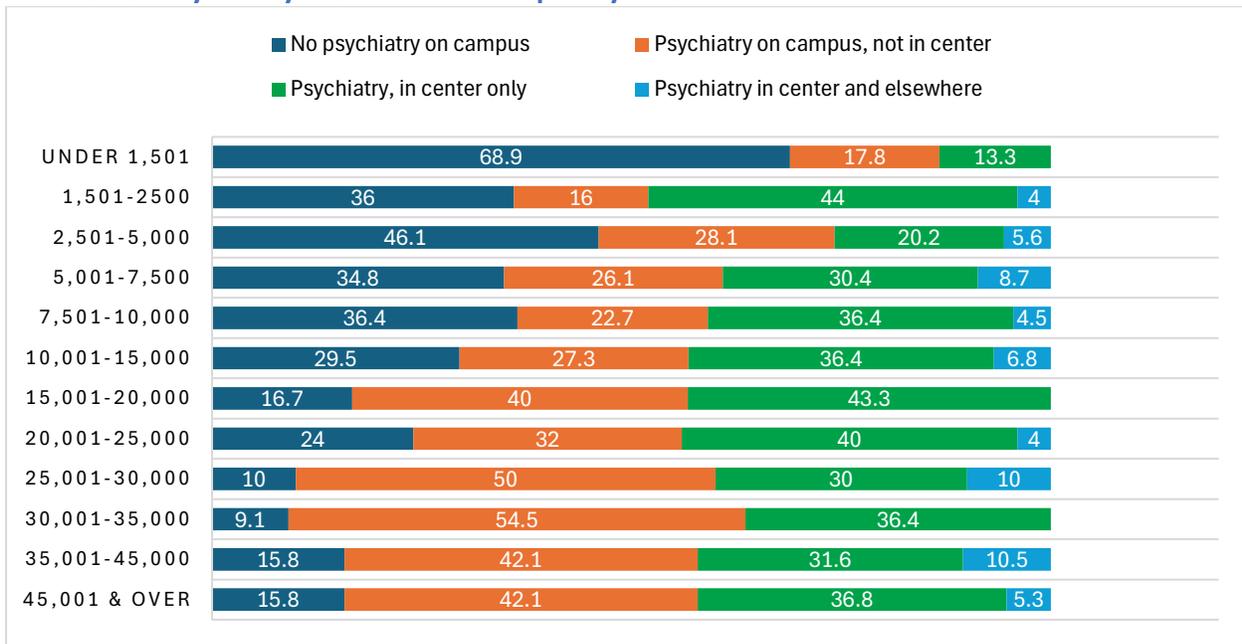

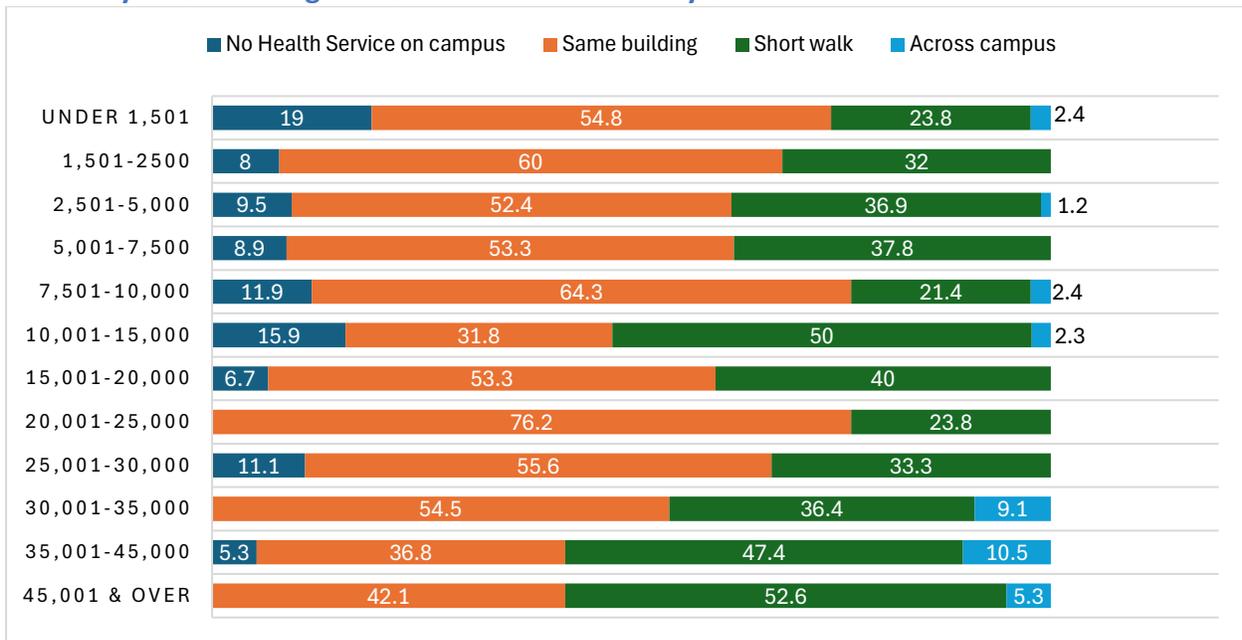

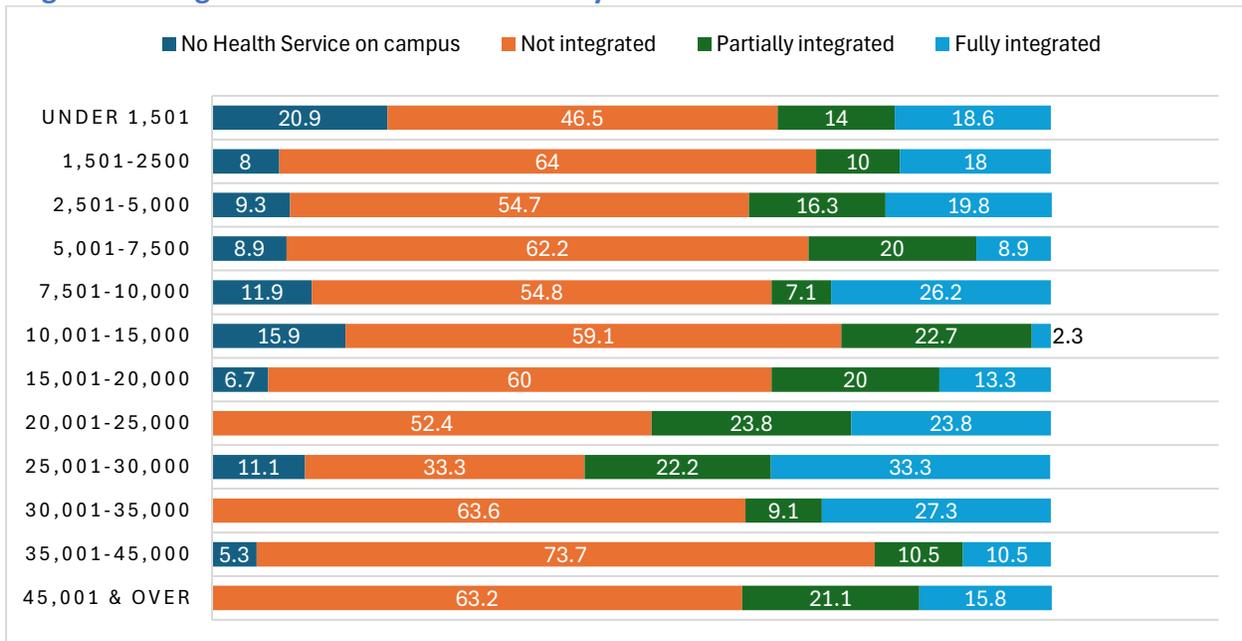

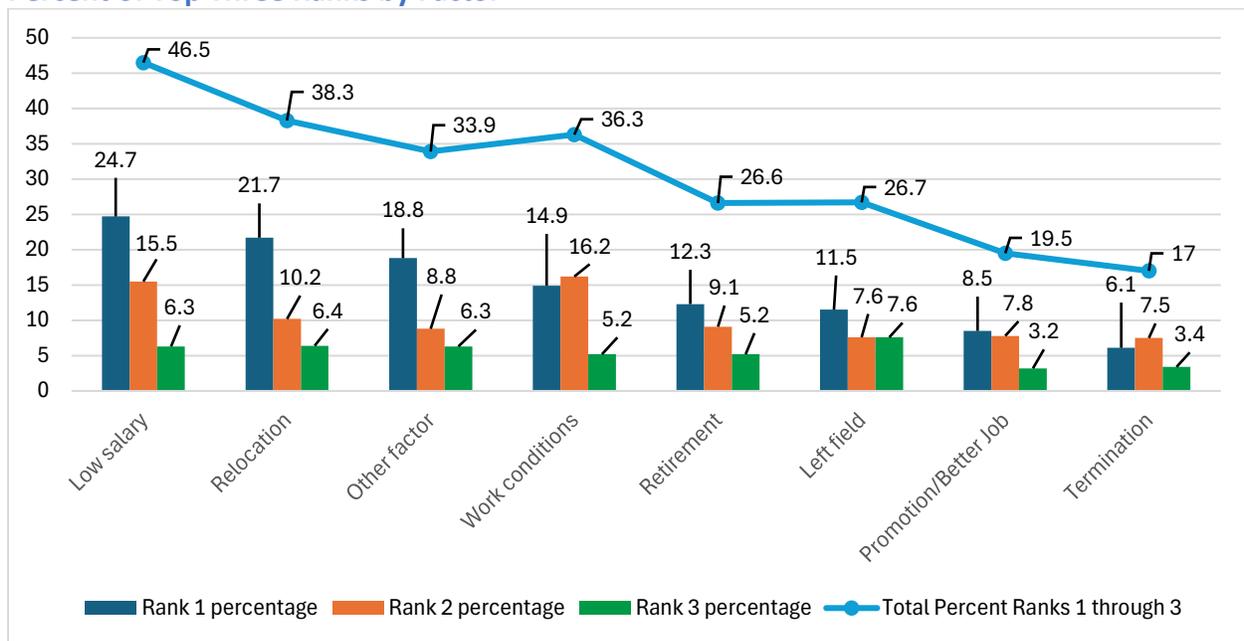

Contribution of Employee Termination to Staff Turnover

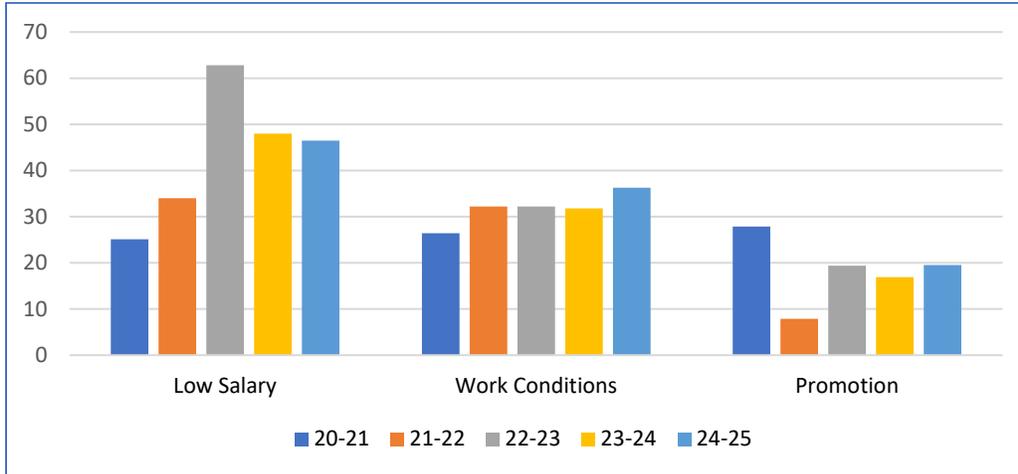

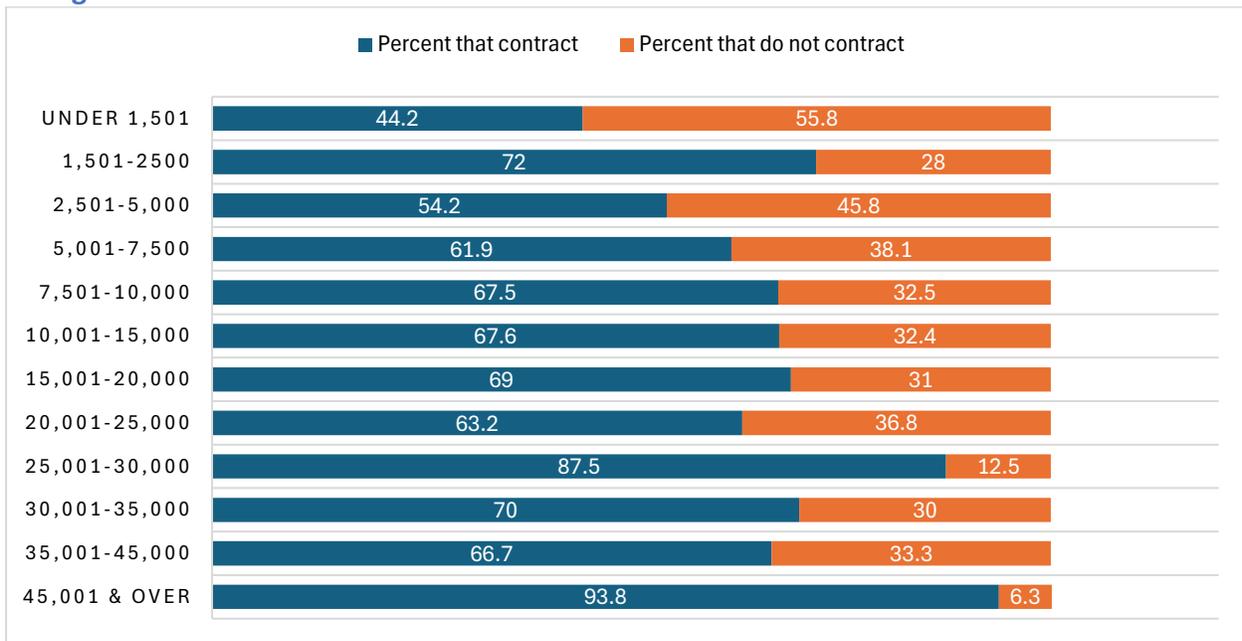

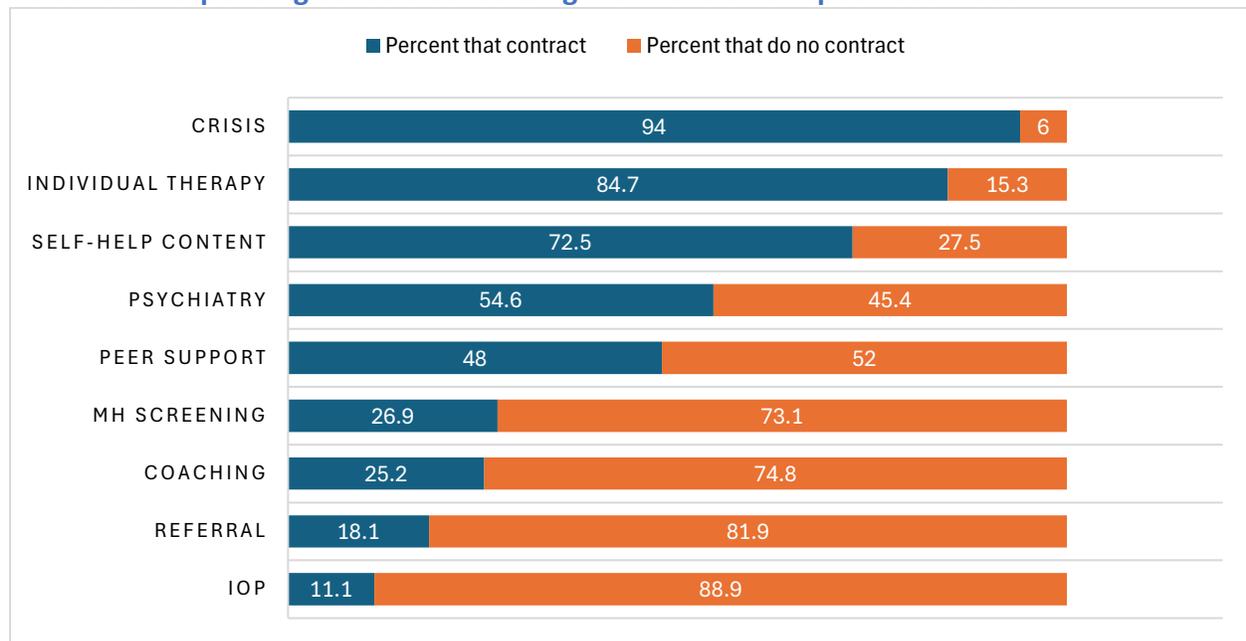

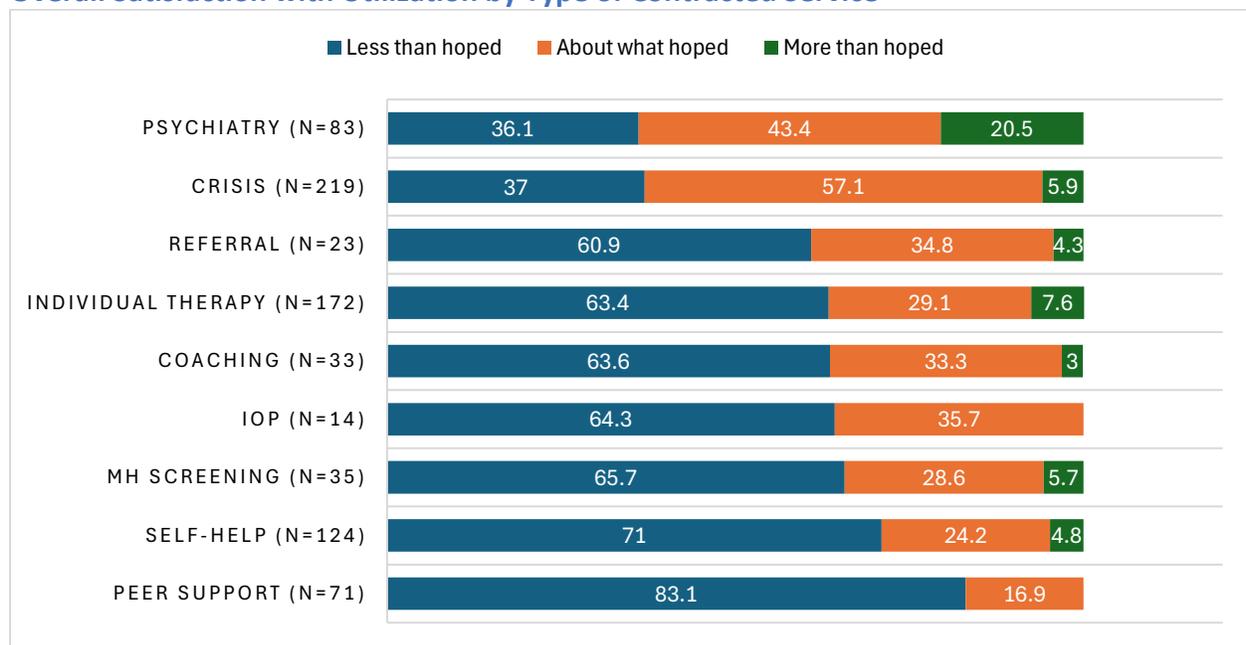
